- Ukraine: total raised was £469.20. This was made up from £263.70 raised in cash from the cake sales and £205.50 raised from online donations for the non-uniform day.


Free Commemorative Jubilee Mug



Newton Poppleford & Harpford Parish Council would like to present a free commemorative Jubilee mug to every child of the Parish aged 3-11 inclusive.


Anyone wishing to purchase a mug for a child not of this age, may do so at a cost of £3.50 each.

From the PTFA



Daily Reading

Research shows the positive impact reading daily has upon children's development. We are keen to ensure that every child (from Reception to Year Six) spends time reading and sharing books every day. The following research demonstrates very clearly the difference daily reading can make.



By the end of 6th grade Student "A" will have read the equivalent of 60 whole school days. Student "B" will have read only 12 school days. Which student would you expect to have a better vocabulary? Which student would you expect to be more successful in school...and in life? (Nagy & Herman, 1987)

Coloured Book Bands

For children reading on the coloured book bands, this means that children (and parents) should only be taking **one book per day from the Book Shed**. (If there is a specific reason why you are unable to access the Book Shed daily, then this needs to be prearranged with the class teacher.) We simply do not have enough books for children to take more than one book per day and this is impacting on some of the children's reading development, as the books they need are not available. This means they are missing out chunks of colour bands, which they need to have access to, as part of their phonetic development. We would be very grateful if every family would follow the policy of one book per day, to ensure that the Book Shed works for everyone. We know the majority of you are already doing this and we really appreciate your support.

Please can books that have been read, be returned to the relevant class box, rather than put back into the reading scheme, as it is easier for us to put them away. Thank you.

Finally, we do not expect the younger children to be reading to you for twenty minutes every day, as that would be rather exhausting for some of them! All the children love to be read to, so ten minutes of them reading to you and then ten minutes of you reading to them would be wonderful.

Accelerated Reader

For children on Accelerated Reader, we would like the children to aim to read for twenty minutes every day. We would still encourage the children on AR to read to a grown up at times, particularly if they are fairly new to AR. It is important that all children are discussing whatever they are reading with you. Mealtimes are often the perfect time to discuss books.

Once the children are in Key Stage Two, they tell us that they are often no longer read to by an adult. They also tell us that they still love to be read to, no matter how old they are. We know that life gets busier the older they become, but having a 'Book Snuggle' is a perfect chance to read a book slightly beyond your child's reading ability to challenge them and improve their comprehension and vocabulary. Perhaps you could read a favourite from when you were their age?

We cannot emphasise enough the impact you as parents have on your children's reading development. Your support at home, to encourage your children to read, not just their school books, but comics, books from home or library books, makes such a difference. Sharing the magic of books with your children and showing them how much you value reading by talking about books and letting them see you read is invaluable. Ultimately we want every child in our school to love reading at whatever level is appropriate for them.
