

# **Curriculum Overview**

In this unit we will learn what life was like for Victorian children. Poor children, even as young as four years old, had to work to help support their families. There were no laws to protect working children. Conditions were poor and often dangerous, with children sometimes expected to work 12-hour shifts with no holidays. Wealthy children schooling -In England, schools were not free until 1891. Until then, children had to pay to go to school. Children from rich families were often educated at home until they were 10 years old. Boys were then sent to Public schools like Eton or Harrow. However, very few schools had availability for girls. Rich girls were usually educated at home.

### **Oueen Victoria**

Queen of the United kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. Queen Victoria's reign spanned sixty-four years, from 1837 - 1901.

#### Dr Barnardo

Dr Barnardo was founder of the charity Barnardo's, who provided homes and education for poor children in Victorian Britain. He gave them shelter, food and training. He accepted all children, regardless of race, disability or circumstance, rescuing around 60,000 children. Lord Shaftesbury

Lord Shaftesbury was a politician who attempted to improve children's lives during the Victorian times.
